### Kmart Corp. HQ redevelopment meeting tonight in Troy

Details of a mixed-use plan for **Pavilions of Troy** at the site of the former **Kmart Corp.** headquarters will go before the **Troy City Council** in a special meeting tonight.

The council is weighing a conceptual plan only for a development at the 43-acre site at Big Beaver Road and Coolidge Highway.

Troy City Manager **Phil Nelson** said no decision is expected at the informational meeting with representatives of Reston, Va.-based **Richardson Development Group Inc.** The site is owned by New York City investment firm **BlackRock Inc.**

The company hopes to build 200 condominiums, retail and restaurants.

Companies hired for the project's design include Southfield-based **Rossetti** and **LSL Planning** which has an office in Royal Oak.

### Kresge Foundation OKs \$750K grant for Detroit Renaissance

The **Kresge Foundation** has approved a \$750,000 grant to **Detroit**

**Renaissance Inc.** to help it fund planning for an aerotropolis initiative and development of a creative corridor in Detroit.

Both initiatives are part of a regional economic plan **Detroit Renaissance** launched last fall.

The grant, to be split between the two projects, serves as an endorsement of the potential of the plan, dubbed "Road to Renaissance," to transform the region's economy, said Senior Program Officer **Laura Trudeau**.

The grant will fund a master plan for the area around **Willow Run Airport** in Ypsilanti and **Detroit Metropolitan Airport** in Romulus, said **Doug Rothwell**, president of **Detroit Renaissance**.

Chicago-based **Jones Lang LaSalle Inc.** (NYSE: JLI) is doing an aerotropolis development study which should be completed by the first quarter next year, said **Anne Masterson**, director of communications for **Detroit Renaissance**.

The Kresge grant also will support development of a creative corridor to attract more creative businesses, Rothwell said.

### Horse track hearing is Oct. 8

Michigan's Office of Racing Commissioner has scheduled an Oct. 8 hearing in Lansing to discuss the applications for 2008 racing licenses, including dates for a to-

be-built thoroughbred track in Wayne County.

The hearing is to give those involved a chance to provide information on proposed schedules and their fitness to be licensed.

**Jerry Campbell**, chairman of **Citizens Republic Bancorp** in Ann Arbor and owner of one of the state's largest horse stables, said he intends to sign an option on land in western Wayne County for a \$70 million to \$80 million thoroughbred track.

Campbell filed paperwork Aug. 31 with the state for 2008 race dates and for a track license.

Campbell is seeking the license for dates given up last month by Aurora, Ontario-based **Magna Entertainment Corp.**

### Ascension Health gets new chief

### New restaurant for Birmingham

A 130-seat Asian restaurant called **Chen Chow Brasserie** plans to open at 260 N. Old Woodward Ave. in Birmingham by mid-October.

The restaurant will also include a 150-seat bar and a 60-seat banquet room.

The restaurant is the latest cre-

ation by **John Janviriyi**, a restaurant owner and designer who designed **Mosaic** in Greektown and **Crave** in Dearborn and owns **Melange** in Ann Arbor. The restaurant is located in the same spot that was previously occupied by **Pampas Churrascaria**, a Brazilian restaurant. Average entree prices at **Chen Chow** are expected to be between \$18 and \$36. Janviriyi describes the style of the cuisine as "pure Asian."
